



State Land Use

Many club hikes are conducted on land owned by the Arizona State Land Department. These are known as “State Trust Land”.

Common examples include these hikes:

- Parking at end of Golder Ranch road (either before gate or at corral)
- Petroglyphs near Catalina
- Fifty-Year Trail, North End
- Big Wash and Bluffs
- Nature Tailings (Several versions)
- Sausalito Creek (Several versions)
- Tortolita Flats, Foothills, Mountains, Preserve, etc.

Many other State-Land hikes are also offered.

Guides, who offer hikes on State Land, are strongly advised to obtain an [Arizona State Land Recreational Permit](#).

Hikers, who participate in such hikes, should be advised of a trespassing issue and should consider obtaining a permit since each permit only applies to the individual, not to the vehicle and not to the group of hikers.
